# THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA OFFICE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

### Division of Student Affairs SPRING 2016 REPORT

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The Office of Student Conduct (OSC) is responsible for investigating alleged violations of the Code of Conduct (Code) and for coordinating the conduct process. Summary statistical reports are generated for public review. *This report reflects data for the time period of January 11 – May 15, 2016 (Spring 2016).* 

#### II. CONDUCT CASE REFERRALS

The OSC receives referrals for conduct action from a variety of sources. Referrals with sufficient information to indicate a potential violation of the Code are assigned to a conduct officer for further investigation and eventual resolution.

#### III. CONDUCT CASE RESOLUTIONS

Conduct cases are not necessarily resolved in the semester in which they were referred to the OSC. Statistics in the remaining portion of the report reflect data for cases that were resolved during Spring 2016 regardless of when they were referred (i.e. some cases were referred during Fall 2015).

Cases are resolved in one of three ways: *no action, informal resolution, or formal resolution.* A conduct officer may find that there is not enough information to indicate that the student has violated the Code, resulting in a *no action* resolution. Cases are resolved *informally* when the student accepts responsibility for violating the Code, agrees with the sanctions assigned by the conduct officer, and waives the right to a formal hearing and appeal. If a student disputes involvement in a violation of the Code or does not agree with the sanctions assigned by the conduct officer, the case is resolved through a *formal* hearing.

#### IV. VIOLATIONS OF THE CODE OF CONDUCT

Multiple alleged violations of the Code may be applied to a case, resulting in a difference between the number of cases resolved and number of violations reported during the same time period. *The first number in the charts below* reflects alleged violations, while the second reflects the number of violations students were found responsible for during Spring 2016 whether through the informal or formal resolution process. NOTE: Regulation 3.4 was updated in January 2016 to include domestic violence, dating violence and stalking. Regulation 3.8 was changed in May 2015 to include reckless obstruction, which unreasonably interferes with the freedom of movement of an individual or group. Regulations 4.1 and 4.4 no longer include distribution; distribution is now encompassed within Regulations 4.2 and 4.5. Regulations 5.1 and 5.2 were changed to include provisions for information. Regulation 8.2 was changed to include provisions for information or accounts.
